**Save the Children's Christmas Jumper Day** aims to raise awareness on boys, girls and teens about the reality that boys and girls like them live, and to suggest a way of participating that involves the whole community in order to raise money set aside for children's survival programs in the most difficult places for childhood.

**Ro**hingya is an ethnic group unknown to most of us that lives in a refugee camp in Bangladesh in a situation of complete vulnerability, after they run away massively from the neighbour country Myanmar, their homeland.

Through this support guide you will know some more about their history and their lives and the difficulties they face in their everyday life, specially minors, the most vulnerable.


# Who are the rohingya people?

#### How many are they?

They are a population of almost a million people that was in the north of Rakhine state in Myanmar (Birmania).

#### Where are they in the map?

Currently, they live in a refugee camp called Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh. 55% of them are kids an Myanmar denies them the citizenship because they consider them bengalí immigrants and not birmanian, despite of having lived centuries in their territory. They are one of the most prosecuted ethnic and religious minority of the world.



#### What is their language?

They speak rohingya language, a dialect from bengali and they are muslims in a buddhist region.

#### Why did they leave their country?


After many years of prosecution and a dormant war between the military government and the rohingya's militiamen, in August 2017, an attack on the military triggered an extreme violent retaliation against the whole community and lead to a massive runaway to the neighbor Bangladesh.



Can you imagine Seville's population running away and living under tents?







The rohingya community does not want to go back to Myanmar until their rights are recognized and the living conditions are safe, meanwhile this happens, boys and girls need access to education in the camps, healthy diet and medical attention. Without the legal refugee status, they can't work in Bangladesh, the children can't go to school and they can be object of abuse and violence. they are families without future and depend on humanitarian organizations to survive.

# Living in a refugee camp is not easy



Many boys and girls do household chores as gathering wood or water in precarious conditions, with rain or walking long distances. Minors, specially girls are afraid of being assaulted and suffering any kind of abuse. The bathroom areas in the camp lack privacy and girls are afrais of going alone.



Boys and girls are the most vulnerable, they live in a precarious way, facing malnutrition, skin diseases, respiratory problems, diahorrea after drinking non-potable water and stress due to everything they have had to live and witnessed.





The camp conditions and the lack of adequate spaces has and effect in their education, there are no playing areas that could allow them to recover from the lived traumas and the overcrowding does not help education.



# **DECORATE THE TEACHER**

## **BOOSTYOUR STUDENTS' CREATIVITY!**

Ask them to decorate a funny jumper for you.



They can use Christmas balls, pompons and sticers... or any other material that boosts their fantasy.







# **Easy Pompons**



Cut two cardboard rings, 4cm diameter with a central hole of approximately 2,5 cm of width.

With a woolen thread make a small hank go through the center.





Tie the thread on the ring and start rolling it until you cover the whole cardboard surface with several layers.





You have to do it until you cover the central hole.





With scissors, cut all the wool from the edge of the ring until you reach the cardboard.

Detach both ringscarefully, without breaking them, and join with double thread the woolen part between the rings.





Break both rings carefully...


And you have your pompon!






# Snowflakes' magic

### Is wool not your thing? Make paper decorations!



Take a A4 paper and make a square, then bend it in half to get a triangle.





Bend it again in half to get a smaller triangle.

Bend inside the left side (over half of the triangle).







Bend the right side towards the left side (you must see both points looking down, like in the drawing).

Cut both endings.



Cut as shown in the picture.





You can make the snowflakes in different shapes and colours and put them on the jumpers with safety pins. You have your Christmas Jumper!





#### **Decorate the school**

With this simple creative activity, you will be able to decorate your school with flags on Christmas Jumper Day with your students.


Take an A4 paper and draw the shape of a jumper, like the drawing on the right.



Pick a string or a ribbon and with tape or a stapler make your flag with the shape of a jumper.



Cut, paint, personalize your Jumper and make many of different sizes and colors.







# A cozy memory for the family

Get recycled fabric or monochromatic fabric in which students can draw.

Cut the fabric (like in the drawing) in rectangular shape (approximately 20 cm long and 10 cm tall). If the fabric is not thick, you can use double layer, sticking the edges together with glue specific for fabrics or warm glue.

On the ends glue on one side the button and on the other side, the elastic, bending it with an oval shape, making a bow.

If the students are too young, we recommend to help them when using the glue.













#### **Photocall Solidario**

Stick the giant logo that we brought to your school into a tough cardboard so the students and their families can take selfies or solidarity pictures.

#### **Christmas tree**



Cut the ornaments that we passes on to you and hang them in the school tree or in the room making a wish on a better future for the rohingya children.

Suggest the families to make a donation for each ornament that decorates the tree, making it a solidarity tree.







## **Sweeten your Christmas Jumper Day**

# On the Christmas party or recital, you can offer families of the students the typical gingerbread biscuits.

#### Ingredients for 30-35 buiscuits

Flour 350 gr
Sugar 160 gr
Butter 50 gr
Egg 1
Salt 1 pinch
Honey 150 gr
Cinnamon powdert 2 flat teaspoon
Nutmeg powder 1/4 teaspoon
Ginger powder 2 flat teaspoon.
Clover poder 1/2 teaspoon
Baking soda 1/2 teaspoon



Food coloring as you like it lcing sugar 150 gr
I egg white



The dough can be frozen for a month aprox. but cookies only last 4-5 days



Sieve the flour with the sugar, add ginger, spices and baking soda; afterwards add the cold slices butter. Add the egg and knead until you get a ball.

Wrap the dough on cling film and let it rest on the fridge for 2 hours.

Roll out the dough until you get the dough on 4 mm. Remove quickly, with the help of shaped cutters shape into christmas dolls. Put them on a tray covered with baking paper, put it into the oven preheated on 180° for 10-12 minutes until they get golden.

Meanwhile, prepare the icing beating the egg white until stiff and adding slowly the icing sugar. Divide the icing in as different bowls as many colours you will use and add to each bowl the food colouring.

With a piping bag, with the flat and narrow nozzle, decorate the gingerbread biscuits.

The dough can be frozen for a month, while the biscuits can only last 4-5 days.
